Operations and Training District Administrative Officer Submitted by Stf/C Mary Dodd, SN

Last month I wrote about the job of the District Administrative Officer (DAO) and the DAO's duties. This month I will talk about the duties of two of the committees that report to the DAO. These are mentioned in the District Bylaws. Next month we will talk about the duties of 3 additional committees that are in the DAO department that are mentioned in the Operations Manual.

Many of the District committees correlate with the committees under the Squadron Administrative Officer. The District Committee members are appointed the District Commander. The chair of that committee has the rank of District Lieutenant. Like the squadron, all activities of the District Administrative Committees deal with the "internal affairs" of the district. Squadron Administrative Committee chairs are part of the related District Administrative Committees.

District 8's Bylaws states the following committees report; to the DAO. The duties of these committees are as follows:

- **2.10.3** The **Membership Committee** shall be composed of three members appointed annually by the commander. This committee shall be familiar with the policies and procedures outlined in the current edition of the USPS Membership Manual and shall coordinate membership activities within the district through the squadrons. The chairman shall have oversight of squadron membership chairmen and shall communicate to them district membership activities. The committee shall assist the squadron committees in their membership efforts.
- **2.10.4** The **Member Involvement Committee** shall be composed of three members appointed annually by the commander. This committee shall work closely with other district committees to encourage participation in district activities by members of district squadrons and, as requested, provide to the squadrons suggestions for programs to increase member participation in squadron activities by providing guidance to the squadron membership committees.

Next month we will talk about the District Boating Activities, District Leadership Development and District Conference committees

<u>The Greatest Sea Evacuation</u> <u>in History</u> Contributed by Lt/C Art Dodd, SN

In this modern age of aircraft and spacecraft, boats are still relevant. This year is the twentieth anniversary of the attack on the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001. In the middle of our grief and despair, many Americans made a difference.

This is from my own recollection: I was at work at the St. Lucie Nuclear Generating Station. The morning of September 11, 2001, was shattered at 8:45 AM when a commercial airliner collided with the south tower of the World Trade Center in lower Manhattan. The initial report I heard from one of my colleagues was that some "idiot" pilot in a small plane ran into the building. We didn't think too much about it.

Then, word was that it wasn't a small plane, that one of the World Trade Center towers had been severely damaged and was on fire.

Soon, a second commercial jet flew low over Manhattan and hit the second tower. Now, we all gathered in a conference room that had a TV and started watching.

We watched as First Responders arrived to try to evacuate people from the upper floors (Did you know that some of the NYPD Firemen made it up as far as the 78th floor, where the plane had struck?).

We watched as the buildings collapsed, one after the other. One of my fellow engineers arrived late to the conference room. He asked, "What happened to the building?" I responded, "It's gone." He asked, "What do you mean it's gone?" I responded, "I mean the building is gone. It collapsed." These were the only spoken words in the room; otherwise, we watched in silence.

Some of us (me) knew people who worked in those buildings. We wondered how many would survive. We found it hard to believe what was happening. Since then, I have read each name on the list of victims; I did not see a name I recognized, so the people I knew survived. One had been the chief engineer for the Port Authority. I still get choked up thinking about it.

As the situation progressed, all public transportation in lower Manhattan was shut down, buses and taxis because of all the emergency equipment and debris in the streets, subways because of possible damage un-





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es were closed. Lower Manhattan was went to help in response to the call. isolated. People were walking or run- They came. ning from the scene and trying to escape. Many looked like zombies, coated with dust, but there seemed to be no way to get out. I remember seeing on TV the people lining the seawall of Lower Manhattan Thousands and thousands of people with nowhere to **qo**.

What I found out years later was that there had been a way out by boat. Hundreds of thousands of people rushed as far south as they could to get away from the damaged building.

There, they started boarding ferries from NY Waterway to get to New Jersey. When the first building collapsed and the dust cloud enveloped Lower Manhattan, people panicked and some started to jump into the river, trying to swim across. Most of the commercial boats - ferries, tour boats, tugboats - started taking people from the seawall

The Coast Guard on Pilot Boat No. 1 took command of the situation to try to organize it somewhat so nobody would will be moved. Guaranteed. be injured in collisions. They put out a call on the radio for anyone in the area to come help. And they came. The Coast Guard advised that boats were to take on as many people as they could, not just how many they were allowed. Everyone helped everyone else.

People on shore waiting to board a boat made sure that those less able, the elderly, the infirm, made it to a boat. In one instance, an elderly woman in her 80's and her German shepard were "crowd surfed" over the heads of the waiting people to get her on a boat. Average American people. These are heroes.

At the end of the day, about 500,000 people were evacuated from Manhattan by boats in about 9 hours. The second largest boatlift in history was the evacuation at Dunkirk in World War II, where a fleet of British boats evacuated 339,000 British soldiers over 9 days.

Boats are, indeed, relevant.


